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... Memorandum, I. G. Bering, Earl of Peur,  
 Wm — bakes and Montgomery; Doctor Day, Schema  
 and the year hereunder written, make Publick  
 and Declare this my Last will; and Testament  
 in manner, and form following, that is to—  
 say, In the first Place, I Give and Devise unto  
 my Mother the Countess Dowager of Pembroke  
 one hundred Pounds, and to my Mother's Husband  
 and Thomas Bernard Esq; one Annuity of  
 one Hundred Pounds a year During his life,  
 also I Give and Devise unto my Dear and lo-  
 ving wife Elisabeth Countess of Pembroke and  
 Montgomery five thousand Pounds lawfull  
 money of Great Britain, also I Give to my  
 Said wife, my Equipage, and Coach Horses,  
 Desiring that the latter, as they grow unfit  
 for Service, may be turned out to grass for  
 the rest of their Lives, and also I Give to my  
 Said wife Elisabeth Countess of Pembroke, and  
 Montgomery, the arse of all, and singular  
 my Plate, till my Son is of age. I Give the same  
 at her Decease (in case of my Son's Decease) —  
 to the Person who shall be Earl of Pembroke and  
 Montgomery, his Heirs, and assigns for ever;

Also & Give to Comet. Lloyd, now of General  
Elliots Regiment of Light Horses, two thousand  
Pounds to be paid him, when he is of age, and  
moreover two hundred Pounds a year during  
his life, and & Recommend him to all my  
friends protection, and Gods Services, Also &  
give to the Treasurer for the time being of the  
Marine Society for the use of the said Society,  
one hundred Pounds, Also & give to the Poor  
of Wilton two hundred Pounds; also & Give to  
the Poor of Salisbury the sum of one hundred  
Pounds to be distributed amongst them, as my  
Executors shall think fit; also & Give to Mr. J.  
also twenty Pounds a year During his life,  
& Desire all my Horses, Mares, Colts, Dogs, and  
Creatures whatsoever may be kept happy  
as long as they live, and & Change my Estate  
accordingly. I mean all whatsoever in any  
Place, or any Country, whatsoever any ways  
belong to me at the Time of my Death at home  
or abroad, and that if any are abroad, any -  
where, they Should be sent for to England im-  
mediately. Also & Give to Mr. Robert Stebbins, Son  
of my Deceased Uncle General William Hor-

bet one hundred pounds per annum One.  
ring his life, and to Miss Herbert Daughter  
<sup>my said</sup> of Uncle Generall William Herbert, the same,  
and to her brother Charles & give the sum of  
one hundred Pounds, I recommend the said  
Mr. Robert Herbert to one of the best livings  
of the Earl of Pembroke, and Mr. Nevil my  
Cousin to another (in case they should buy  
or either of them go into orders), also & give  
to the Treasuer of Greenwich Hospital for the  
time being one hundred Pounds, for the use  
of that Hospital, and to the Treasuer of Chel-  
sea Hospital for the time being eighty Pounds  
for the use of that Hospital, To the Treasuer  
of St. George's Hospital for the time being fifty  
Pounds, for the use of that Hospital, To the  
Treasuer of the Hospital commonly called  
the Foundling Hospital for the time being  
fifty Pounds for the use of that Hospital, To  
the Treasuer of the Small Pox and Inoculatory  
Hospital for the time being fifty Pounds for the  
use of that Hospital, and to the Treasuer of  
the Lock Hospital for the time being fifty Pounds  
for the use of that Hospital, and to the London

Hospital the same; also to give to Mr. Annes  
my Lawyer two thousand Pounds, To Mr.  
Des Cloines one hundred Pounds, To the Child  
of Antonio Piccoli of Florence to whom I  
stood Godfather one annuity, or yearly  
sum of six Pounds of Lawfull money of  
Great Britain for, and During the Term of  
His Natural life, clear of all Taxes, and  
Deductions whatsoever; also to my Godson  
Henry De Mescay, second son of Mr. De Mescay  
Cryer of Lousanne in Switzerland fifty —  
Pounds, also to give to the Child of Mr. Angelo,  
to whom I stood Godfather one annuity of  
twenty Pounds of lawfull Money of Great  
Britain, for and During the Term of His  
Natural life, clear of all Taxes, and Deduc-  
tions whatsoever, To Mr. Bourgeat Cryer of  
Lions two hundred Pounds, also to give to Re-  
beat Mathison three hundred Pounds, To Mr.  
Bisell Twenty Pounds a year During his life.  
also to give to Mr. Gose of Salisbury one hun-  
dred Pounds, and to Mr. Seward of Witton two  
hundred Pounds, also to give to Mr. Maximilian  
Cryer the one at Witton, and the Bow, and arrows

and also the sum of one hundred Pounds,  
also to give to Mr. Edward Baker of Bull bridge  
the sum of one hundred Pounds, also to give  
to the Honourable James Stopford all my Gras.  
I desire that such of my Store of Horses as I leave  
may cover Gratis for the Benefit of the Coun-  
try, and for such Gentlemen, as may chuse  
to send horses to any of them, and that this  
may be conveniently advertised yearly as  
long as the Horses live, also to give to Gras per  
pe sodecim twelve Pounds a year During  
his life, and to also give to Mr. John Little fifty  
Pounds, also to give to Lewis De Brett Cocks -  
tenty Pounds, also to give to William  
Wauhiller Valet De Chambre twelve pounds  
per annum During his natural life, and  
fifty pounds in money, and to James Keune  
By the same in both respects as to Wauhiller,  
and to give to Dalton twelve pounds a year  
During his life, also to give to my att my  
Gardens twelve pounds a year During his  
life, & leave my manuscript, remarks &c.  
on Horsemanship &c, to Mr. James Stopford  
and to direct that to whom any Papers, Books,

or Parcels are directed, the same shall be delivered to such persons for their use unopened, and I desire that all my other papers, not on Business or Consequence, may be immediately Burnt. also I Give to all my Servants of what Service Capacity, Sex, or Station, Workmen, Labourers &c both in Town and Country, or else where, and who shall be in my service at the time of my Decease, and not herein before particularly named, the sum of three pounds a year during their respective lives. also I Give to my Grooms Ignatius, Joseph and others my ten Pounds a year to each of them during their respective lives. And also I Give to the Reverend Mr. Thomas Hill now at Arreton with Comet Lloyd two hundred Pounds in money, and moreover the sum of one hundred and fifty Pounds a year during his life, and recommend Mr. Lloyd to this care and Goodness, I likewise recommend the aforesaid Mr. Hill to the first vacant living of the Earls of Pembroke. —

I Give to Miss Elizabeth Catharine Hunter three thousand Pounds, and I recommend

to her in the strongest manner possible  
the care of the Education of any Child or  
Children of which she may be brought  
to bed, & within ten months after the Date  
of this will, & if a boy or Boys in the same  
way as I do in this will that of my law.  
full Child to my wife, & leave Miss Huns-  
ter the sole Guardian of her own said  
Child or Children, and big in case of  
her Decease that she will immediat-  
ely appoint others as she shall think fit,  
I dare say she will approve of Mr. James  
Stopford; and that he would willingly  
out of friendship for me undertake it,  
also & Give to Captain Robert Ridell  
of the Hunter Frigate one hundred —  
Pounds, all the pecuniary legacies above  
mentioned are to be Lawfull money  
of Great Britain, and to be paid within  
three Months after my Decease in case  
the same should be demanded, & Charge  
all my Estates both Real and Personal  
that I have power to charge with the same,  
with the payment of all the before mention'd.

ned amittes, and Legacies, and I desire  
my Executors herein after named may as  
soon as conveniently may be after my Decease  
give notice to all the Legatees herein named,  
of so much of this my will, as relates to  
each Legatee, I make my wife sole Quar-  
tian of my Son, and of every thing what-  
soever belonging to him at my Decease,  
and recommend to her concerning him  
as follows, That his Education may be  
first a French School, next Eton, next  
abroad, and never at any English Univer-  
sity, that he may be taught French,  
Italian, and German, and follow the  
Exercises of Riding, Tencing and Dancing,  
That attention may be given to Instruct  
him particularly in History and Mathe-  
matics, and a little knowledge of the Law,  
that he may be an <sup>not</sup> Idle Gentleman, but  
have some occupation such as his genit-  
may prompt him to, and he may chuse  
whatsoever his vocation may be let him  
begin early to engage in it, but not to be too  
soon abandooned, and left quite to himself,

not to much constrained; I leave my Hou-  
se at White Hall to my wife till my son is  
twenty five years of age, or is married, and  
for life in case of his Decease, and she has no  
other Son by me, and I desire my said wife,  
in case of any unforeseen accident to herself,  
immediately to name proper Guardians for  
my Son, as she shall think fit, in case of her  
Decease, and as to all the Rest and residue of  
my Estate not herein before disposed of, I give  
and Bequeath the same unto my Son George  
Herbert, his Executors and Administrators  
of this my will, and I leave them five hund.  
red pounds each, and hereby I do revoke,  
and make void all former, and other wills  
by me at any time hereto fore made, Decla-  
ring this only to be my Last will, and Tes-  
tament, In witness whereof I the said  
Henry Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery  
The Testator, have to this my Last will and  
Testament contained in this and ~~two~~ two  
going Sheets of paper, set my hand and  
Seal to each Sheet the fourteenth Day of April,

One thousand and seven hundred and sixty  
Five, in the <sup>Year</sup>  
Year of the Reign of our Sovereign  
Lord George the Third, by the Grace of God  
Great Britain, France, and Ireland King,  
Defender of the faith, and so forth, as afores.

Declared by the said Testator  
Henry Earl of Pembroke and  
Montgomery esq, and for his  
Last will, and Testament, in  
the Presence of us, who at his  
Request, have subscribed our  
Names, as witnesses hereto, in
