Memorandum. I Henry Earl of Pembroke, and Montgomery &c: do the day, and  
 the Year underwritten, make, publish, and declare this, my last Will, and  
 Testament, in manner, and form following, that is to say, in the first place  
 I give, and devise unto my Mother, the Countess Dowager of Pembroke &c: one  
 hundred pounds, and to my Mother's Husband Thomas Bernard Esq<sup>r</sup>: one  
 annuity of one hundred pounds, a year during his life. Also I give, and devise  
 unto my dear, and loving Wife Elizabeth Countess of Pembroke, and Montgomery  
 five Thousand pounds, lawfull money of Great Britain; also I give to my said Wife,  
 my Equipage, and Coach Horses, desiring, that the latter, as they grow unfit  
 for service, may be turned out to graft for the rest of their lives, and also I  
 give unto my said Wife Elizabeth Countess of Pembroke, and Montgomery &c:  
 the use of all, and singular my plate, till my Son is twenty five Years of  
 Age, or is married. I give the same at her decease, in case of my Sons decease  
 also, to the person, who shall be Earl of Pembroke, and Montgomery &c: his heirs  
 and Assigns for ever. Also I give to Comet Floyd, now of General Elliott's Regiments  
 of Light Dragoons one hundred pounds in money, and one hundred pounds  
 a year, during his life, and I recommend him to all my Friends protection,  
 and good services. Also I give to the Treasurers for the time being of the Marine  
 Society, for the use of the said society, sixty pounds. Also I give to the poor of Wilton  
 one hundred, and fifty pounds. Also I give to the poor of Salisbury one hundred  
 pounds, to be distributed amongst them, as my executors shall think fit. Also I give  
 to Mr. Angelo twenty pounds a year, during his life. I desire that all my Horses,  
 Mares, Geldings, Foals, Geldings, Dogs, and Creatures whatsoever, may be kept happy as  
 long as they live, and I charge all my Estates, of all kinds whatsoever, both real,  
 and personal, that I have power to charge with the same, accordingly. I mean  
 all Animals whatsoever, which belong to me at the time of my decease, in any  
 place, or in any Country, at home, or abroad, and that, if any are abroad  
 any where, they shall be immediately sent for home to England, and taken  
 care of, as above mentioned. Also I give to Mr. Robert Herbert, Son of my deceased Uncle  
 General William Herbert two hundred pounds in Money, and one hundred pounds  
 per annum during his life; and to Miss Herbert, Daughter of my said deceased Uncle  
 General William Herbert, fifty pounds a year during her life, and to her Brother Charles  
 I give the sum of one hundred pounds. I recommend the said Mr. Robert Herbert, to  
 one of the best livings in the gift of the Earl of Pembroke, and Montgomery &c:  
 And Mr. Nevil my Cousin to another, in case they should both, or either of them  
 go into Orders. Also I give to the Treasurers of Greenwich Hospital, for the time  
 being, one hundred pounds, for the use of that Hospital, and to the Treasurer  
 of Chelsea Hospital for the time being, seventy pounds, for the use of that Hospital  
 to the Treasurer of the Hospital commonly called the Foundling Hospital, for the  
 time being, fifty pounds for the use of that Hospital. To the Treasurer of St. George's  
 Hospital, for the time being, fifty pounds for the use of that Hospital, to the Treasurer  
 of the Small pox, and Inoculation Hospital, for the time being, fifty pounds, for the  
 use of that Hospital, to the Treasurer of the Lock Hospital for the time being, fifty  
 pounds for the use of that Hospital, and to the London Hospital the same.  
 Also I give to Anthony Sanger Esq<sup>r</sup>: one thousand pounds, to Mr. Des Floris one  
 hundred pounds, Also I give to the Child of Antonio Picchi of Florence, to  
 whom I stood Godfather, one annuity, or yearly sum, of six pounds of lawfull  
 Money of Great Britain, for, and during the term of his natural life, clear of all taxes  
 and deductions whatsoever. I give to the Child of Mr. Angelo, to whom I stood Godfather  
 one annuity of twenty pounds of lawfull Money of Great Britain for, and during  
 the term of his natural life, clear of all taxes, and deductions whatsoever, commencing  
 from the time of his Father's death only. I give to Mr. Bourglat Esq<sup>r</sup>: in France, one  
 hundred pounds. Also I give to Mr. Robert Matheson three hundred pounds,

and to Mr. Seward of Wilton, two hundred pounds. Also I give to Maximilian  
Ligat Esq<sup>r</sup>: The Owl at Wilton, and the Bon, and Arrows, and also the sum of  
one hundred pounds, to Mr. Binel twenty pounds a year during his life. Also  
I give to Mr. Gore of Salisbury one hundred pounds. Also I give to Edward Baker  
Esq<sup>r</sup>: of Ballbridge one hundred pounds. Also I give to Lord Stopford all  
my guns, which have been commonly used for shooting. I desire, that such  
of my Horses & horses, as I leave, may cover grazes for the benefit of the  
Country, and for such Gentlemen, as may chuse to send Mans to them, and  
that this may be constantly advertised yearly as long, as any such horses  
shall live. Also I give to Giuseppe Soderini Fidler ten pounds a year  
during his life. I give to Mr. John Little fifty pounds. Also I give to Louis  
Brett Cook twelve pounds. Also I give to William Wauthier my Valet de Chambre  
twelve pounds a year during his life. And I also give him all my Cloaths  
and wearing apparel whatever I give to James Kennedy twelve pounds per  
annum during his life. Also I give to Dalton ten pounds a year during  
his life. I give to Wyatt my gardener at Wilton ten pounds a year  
during his life. I desire all my Manuscripts on Horsemanship may be  
given to Lord Stopford, and I direct, that to whom any bags, or  
parcels &c: are directed, the same shall be delivered to such persons  
unopened, and I desire, that all my other papers, not on business,  
or consequence, may be immediately burnt. I give to all my Servants  
of whatsoeuer capacity, sea, or station, workmen, labourers &c: both  
in Town, and Country, at home, abroad, or elsewhere, and who  
shall be in my service at the time of my decease, and not  
herein mentioned particularly, the sum of two pounds a year  
each during their respective lives. Also I give to my grooms Ignace the  
Spaniard, Joseph Dimel the German, and Henry Coward eight pounds  
a year to each of them during their respective lives. If Ignace should  
die before a Daughter of his, to whom I stood Godfather, I give  
to her after her Father's decease the same annuity of eight pounds a year  
during her life. Also I give to the Reverend Mr. Thomas Hill, now at  
Wright with Comet Floyd, fifty pounds a year, till such time, as there  
shall be some whatever vacant living in the gift of the Earl of  
Pembroke offered him or till such time as the Earl of Pembroke shall  
procur him any other living whatsoever of the yearly of one hundred  
pounds per annum, and I strongly recommend Comet Floyd to his care and  
goodness. I give to Miss Elizabeth Catharina Hunter three thousand pounds,  
and I recommend to her in the strongest manner possible the care of the  
education of any Child, or Children, of which she may be brought to  
bed within ten months after the date of this will. If a boy, or boys  
in the same way, as I do in this will that of my Son to my Wife.  
Leave Miss Hunter the sole guardian of her own said Child, or Children, of  
which she may be brought to bed within the above-mentioned time,  
and beg in case of her decease, that she will appoint some other,  
or others, as she shall think fit. I dare say she will approve of  
Lord Stopford, and that he, out of friendship for me, would  
willingly undertake it. Also I give to Captain Riddell of the  
Hunter Privateer one hundred pounds. The following lines marked  
u before them is a copy of a bond given by me to Miss Hunter

"I Henry Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery, to hereby oblige myself, Miss  
Elizabeth Catharina Hunter having made void abind of twenty thousand  
pounds in her favor, to which Gibbs Cranford, and Thomas South's Esq.<sup>85</sup>  
were witnesses in the month of February this year, one thousand, seven  
hundred, and sixty two, and on condition, that the said bond stands void,  
and null, and not else, to pay yearly to the said Miss Elizabeth Catharina  
Hunter for her life, the sum of eight hundred pounds per annum, lawfull money  
of Great Britain, clear of all taxes, and deductions whatsoever, and I also  
oblige myself, on the above said conditions, and not else, to pay  
to any Child, or Children she may be brought to bed of, within  
ten months after the date of this, for its, or their lives, the yearly  
sum of two hundred pounds per annum, clear of all taxes, and  
deductions whatsoever, from the time of its, or their birth, and  
moreover to give to the said Child or Children, at the age of sixteen  
years old, the sum of three thousand pounds, lawfull money  
of Great Britain, clear of all taxes, and deductions whatsoever  
to be then paid into the hands of Miss Hunter, or into those of the  
Child, or Children's guardians, for the sole use of the said Child,  
or Children, and accordingly I charge all my Estates both real, and  
personal, that I have power to charge with the same, with the  
payment of this obligation, in witness whereof I have hereunto set  
my hand, and seal at Utrecht this fifteenth day of April, one  
thousand, seven hundred, and sixty two.

and I make the performance of the above Bond, on the conditions mentioned  
in it, part of my Will, in case it should not otherwise stand good  
but not else. And all the rest, and residue of my Estate, not herein  
disposed of, I give, and bequeath the same unto my Son George Herbert,  
his Executors, and Administrators. All the pecuniary legacies herein  
mentioned to be lawfull money of Great Britain, and to be paid  
within twelve months after my decease, in case the same should be  
demanded. The Annuitie to be also paid in lawfull money of  
Great Britain, and as ordered in this will, and I charge all  
my Estates both real, and personal, that I have power to charge with  
the same, with the payment of all the herein mentioned Legacies,  
and annuitie, and I desire my Executors herein after named, may as  
soon as conveniently may be, after my decease give notice to all the  
Legatus, and Annuitants herein named of so much of this my Will, as

as relates to each legatee, and annuitant. I make my Wife sole  
on Guardian of my Son, and of every thing whatsoever belonging to  
him at my Decease, and recommend to her concerning him, as  
follows. That his Education may be first a French School, next  
at Home, next abroad, and never at an English University, that he  
may be taught Italian, and German, and follows the exercices of  
Riding, Fencing, and Dancing. That he may be particularly  
instructed in History, and Mathematicks, and a little Knowledge  
of the Law. That he may not be an idle Gentleman, but  
have some occupation, such, as his genius may prompt him to,  
and he may chuse. Whatever his Vocation may be, let him  
begin early to engage in it but not be too soon abandoned, and  
be left quite to himself, nor too much constrained. I desire my house  
at White Hall may be immediately left for one, and twenty years  
counting from the date of this will, and that the money it  
gives in may be employed, as my Executors shall think fit,  
for the benefit of my Son George, and after his death, I leave  
the said House in perpetuity to whosoever shall be Earl of Pembroke  
or ge: I desire my said Wife, in case of any unforseen accident to  
herself, immediately to name proper Guardians for my Son,  
as she shall think fit. And I do hereby nominate, constitute, and  
appoint my Wife, the Duke of Marlborough, The Right Honorable  
Henry Bilson Legge, The Honorable Robert Herbert, and Anthony  
Lanyer Esq: joint Executors of this my Will, and I leave them two  
hundred pounds each, and hereby I do revoke, and make void  
all former, and other wills, by me at any time heretofore  
made, declaring this only to be my last Will, and Testament, in  
witness whereof I, the said Henry Earl of Pembroke, and  
Montgomery &c: the Testator, have, to this my last will, and  
Testament, contained in this, and the two foregoing sheets of  
paper, set my hand, and seal to each sheet, the seventeenth day  
of May, one thousand, seven hundred, and sixty two, at  
Wheat
