 publish, and declare this my last will and —
 Testament in manner and forme following, that is
 to say, In the first place to Give and Devise unto my Mother
 the Countess Dowager of Pembroke, one hundred pounds.
 and to my Brother's Husband Thomas Beauclerk Esq;
 the Annuity of one hundred pounds a year During
 his life, also to Give and Devise unto my dear and loving
 wife Elizabeth Countess of Pembroke and Montgomey
 for her life one Annuity yearly sum of two thousand
 pounds of lawfull money of Great Britaine, over and
 above what is already settled upon her Clear of all
 Taxes and Deductions whatsoever payable Quarterly
 the first Quarterly Payment to be made at the end of
 three months next after my Decease, also to Give to my
 said wife my equipage and Coach House, Desiring,
 that the latter, as they grow unfit for service, may
 be turned out to Grass for the Rest of their lives, also to give
 to my said wife Elizabeth Countess of Pembroke and
 Montgomey the use of all, and tuncular my Plate
 till my son is of age, to give the same at her Decease for
 use of my son (Decease) to the Person who shall be
 Earl of Pembroke and Montgomey, his Heirs and as
 signs for ever. also to Give to Comte Floyd now of Gene
 val Elliott's Regiment of Light Horse two thousand
 pounds, to be paid him, when he is of age, and more
 over two hundred pounds a year During his life, and
 to recommended himt all my friends protection, and
 good services, also to Give to the Pleasance for the time
 being of the Ormiston Society for the use of the said So
 ciety one hundred pounds, also to Give to the poor in
 Wilton two hundred pounds, also to Give to the poor in
 Salisbury the sum of one hundred pounds, to be distri

Buted amongst them as my Executors shall think fit,
also & give to Mrs. Angels forty Pounds a year During
his life, also to Mrs. Angels fifty Pounds. I desire all my
Horses, Mares, Colts, Dogs and Creatures whatsoever,
may be kept happy as long as they live, and I charge
my Estate accordingly. I mean all whatsoever is any
place or any Country whatsoever any ways belongs
to me at the time of my Death at home, or abroad, and
that if any are abroad anywhere, they should be sent for
to England immediately. also I give to Mr. Charles —
Herbert, Son of my Deceased Uncle General William
Herbert one hundred pounds per annum During
his life, and to Mr. Robert Herbert another son of
my said Deceased Uncle General William Herbert
two hundred pounds a year, During his life, and
Miss Herbert Daughter of my said Uncle General
William Herbert two thousand Pounds. I Give to
Roger Staples one hundred pounds. I Give to James
Harris Esq^r of Saum one hundred pounds. I recom-
mend the said Mr. Robert Herbert to one of the best Li-
vings of the ~~other~~ Earl of Pembroke, and Mr. Nevil
my Cousin to another, to whom I Give one hundred
Pounds (in case they should both be either of them go
into Orders) also I give to the Treasurers of Greenwich
Hospital for the time being two hundred pounds, for
the use of that Hospital, and to the Treasurers of
Chelte Hospital for the time being one hundred pounds
for the use of that Hospital, to the Treasurers of St. —
Georges Hospital for the time being fifty pounds for
the use of that Hospital. To the Treasurers of the
Hospital commonly Call'd the Foundling Hospital
for the time being fifty pounds, for the use of that
Hospital. To the Treasurers of the small Pox, and the
culation Hospital for the time being fifty Pounds for
the use of that Hospital, And to the Treasurers of the
Lock Hospital for the time being fifty pounds for the

use of that Hospital, and to the London Hospital at the same, also to give to Mr. Anthony Sawyers two hundred Pounds, said Pounds, To Mr. Des Clercs two hundred Pounds, To the Child of Antonio Picchi of Florence to whom I stood Godfather, one annuity or yearly sum of six pounds of Lawfull Money of Great Britain for and During the Term of his Natural life clear of all Taxes and Deductions whatsoever. To my Godson Henry De Meseay, second son to me, De Meseay Esques of Lancashire in Switzerland, two hundred pounds, also to give to the Child of Mr. Angelo to whom I stood Godfather, one annuity of twenty pounds of Lawfull Money of Great Britain, for and During the Term of his Natural life, clear of all Taxes and Deductions whatsoever, To Mr. Bouagelat Esques of Lyons two hundred pounds, also to give to Robert Mathison three hundred pounds, To Mr. Burrell twenty Pounds a year During his life, also to give to Mr. Gore of Salisbury one hundred pounds, and to Mr. Penrudd of Wilton two hundred Pounds, also to give to Mr. Maximilian Fergat the one at Wilton, and the Bowditch arms, and also the sum of two hundred Pounds, also to give to Mr. Edward Baker of Bull bridge the sum of one hundred pounds, also to give to the Honourable James Stappford all my Goods. I desire, that such of my Slave Horses, as I leave may cover Grates for the Benefit of the Country, and for their Gentleman, as may chance to send Mares to any of them, and this may be conveniently adventured yearly as long, as the Horses live. also to give to Sir George Mervyn one hundred pounds, also to give to Giuseppe Soddeni twenty pounds a year During his life, also to give to Daniel Mr. Adams one annuity of yearly sum of forty Pounds of Lawfull Money of Great Britain, for and During the Term of his Natural life clear

off all Taxes and Dedicutions whatsoever, payable
quarterly, the first quarterly payment to be made
at the end of three months next after my Death, -
and I also give to Mr. John Little fifty Pounds, also
I give to Lewis De Brett two hundred Pounds, also
I give to Mr. John Shelly one hundred Pounds, also
I give to Captain Alex^t. Montgomerie of Ireland
one hundred pounds. also I give to William
Wantelaer Vales De Chambray two hundred pounds,
and to James Keur by one annuity of twenty
pounds a year during his life. also I give to
Daltos twenty Pounds a year during his life. -
also I give to William Stokes twenty Pounds a
year during his life. also I give to my att my
Grandson five pounds a year during his life.
I leave my manuscript Remarks and our
Horsemanship &c^t to Mr. James Stopford, and
I direct that to whom ever appears Bages or
parcels are directed the same shall be delivered
to such persons for their use unopened, and to de-
sire that all my other papers, not on Buff paper
or Conquerant, may be immediately burnt. also
I give to all my servants of whatsoever capacity,
Lev^t, or Station soever, workman, Labourer &c^t
both in Town and Country, and who shall be in
service at the time of my Decease, and not dealing
before particularly named the sum of three
pounds a year each during their respective Lives.
also I give to my Grooms & Coach Joseph, and
Elmy ten pounds a year to each of them during
their respective Lives. and also I give to the Revd^d
Mr Thomas Hill now at Arreton with Comst^k
Lloyd two hundred pounds in Money, and moreover
the sum of one hundred and odd fifty Pounds a
year during his life, and recommend Mr Lloyd
to his care and Goodness. I likewise recommend
the aforesaid Revd^d Mr Hill to the first Vacant living

of the Earl of Pembroke. I give the sum of one hundred Pounds to the following Gentleman, - D,
son of Huntingdon, Lord Bute, Captain Hawke, the
Rev'd Mr Benjamin Woodroffe, the Hon^dble
noble Captain Augustus Harvey, Doctor Dan^r
ree, Captain Lion, Captain Bayntun, Lieute. -
naut Col. Erskine, S^r. Sydney M^rdon, Mr Thomas
Bawby, Mr Besenger, S^r. Charles Bingley, Mr.
William Hamilton, his Majestys Equerry, Lord
Charkinot, and Lord Newtowr, and I desire
that any Debts & may have made be discharged as
soon as possible, after every thing in this will is
complied with.

I have given to Miss Catharina Elizabeth Hunter
a Bond for twenty thousand Pounds, the sum of
it was drawn up in makes me fear it will not
standing good. If it should not, but not else, I
hereby bequeath to her the said sum of twenty
thousand pounds, on condition that she imme-
diately by will leaves it after her Death to any
Child or Children equally divided among them,
she may have from me, or be pregnant of from
me at the time of my Death. If there should be
no such Child or Children, or if they are dead,
and they should die, I leave the whole twenty
thousand pounds totally at her will, and plea-
sure to possess and afterwards dispose of, as she may
please. If there should be such a Child or Chil-
dren, I recommend them and their education to her
in the same way, as I do in this will that of my
lawfull child to my wife, I leave her this Quan-
tum, and beg in case of her decease that the
will immediately appoint others. also I give to
Captain Robert Redell to the Hunter Brigate
two hundred Pounds all the pecuniary Lega-
cies about mentioned are to be lawfull money
of great Britain, and to be paid within thare.

Mouths after my Decease in case the same shall
be demanded. & Charge all my Estates both Real &
Personal, that I have power to Charge wherthe
same, with the Payment of all the before men-
tioned Annuites and Legacies, and I desire my
Executor hereinafter named may as soon as pos-
sibly may be after my Decease, give notice
to all the legatees herein named of so much of
this my will, as relates to each Legatee. & make
my wife Sole Guardian of my Son, and of every
thing what ever belonging to him, at my Desire
and recommend to her concerning him as followeth.
That his Education may be first at a French School
next thence, next abroad, and never at any En-
glish University, that he may be taught, French,
Italian, and German, and follow the Exercises of
Riding, Fencing and Dancing. That attention
may be given to instruct him particularly in —
History and Mathematicks, and a little knowl-
edge of the Law; that he may not be an Idle
Gentleman, but have some occupation, such
as his Genius may prompt him to, he may —
choose whatever his vocation may be, let him
begin early to engage in it, but not to be too soon
abandoned, and left quite to himself non too
much constrain'd. I leave my House at White
Hall to my wife till my Son is twenty five years
of age, or is married, and for life in case of my
Decease, and in case she has no other Son by me.
and I desire my said wife, in case of any unfor-
seen accident to herself, immediately to name
proper Guardians for my Son as she shall
think fit, in case of her Decease. and as to all the
Rest, and residue of my Estate, not herein before
disposed of, & give and bequeath the same to my
son George Herbert, his Executors and Admi-
nistrators and thereby nominate fourto take

and appoint Mr. Henry Belfour Legge, Mr. Robert Herbeat, Mr. Anthony Sawyer Mr. Edward le Grand, and the Honourable James Stappord, your executors of this my will, and to leave them five hundred pounds each, and hereby to do revoke, and make void all former and other wills by me at any time hereto fore made, Declaring this only to be my last will and testament, In witness whereof the said Henry Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery, the Testator have to this my last will and testament countersigned in this and the foregoing sheets of Paper set my hand and seal to each sheet the 11th Day of March one thousand seven hundred and sixty two, in the first year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Third, by the Grace of God of Great Britain, France and Ireland, King Defender of the Faith, and so forth at Arrears. —
