

Memorial andum. I Henry Earl of  
 Pembroke and Mountgomery do hereby  
 and the apaphenunder written, make  
 publish, and declare this my last will and  
 Testament in manner and form following, that is  
 to say, in the first place I Give and Devise unto my Mother  
 the Countess Dowager of Pembroke, one hundred pounds  
 and to my Mother's Husband, Thomas Beauchamp Esq.  
 one Annuity of one Hundred Pounds a year during  
 his life. also I Give and Devise unto my Dear and Loving  
 wife Elizabeth Countess of Pembroke and Mountgomery  
 for her life one Annuity or yearly sum of two thousand  
 pounds of lawfull money of Great Brittain, over and  
 above what is already settled upon her Clean of all  
 Taxes and Deductions whatsoever, payable Quarterly  
 the first Quarterly Payment to be made at the end of  
 three Months next after my Decease, also I Give to my  
 said wife my Equipage and Coach Horses, Desiring, -  
 that the latter, as they grow unfit for service, may  
 be turned out to Grass for the Rest of their lives, also I Give  
 to my said wife Elizabeth Countess of Pembroke and  
 Mountgomery the Use of all, and singular my Plate  
 till my Son is of age, I Give the same at her Decease for  
 Life of my Son's Decease to the Person who shall be  
 Earl of Pembroke and Mountgomery, his Heirs and as-  
 signs for ever. also I Give to Cornet Floyd now of Gene-  
 ral Elliot's Regiment of Light Horse two thousand  
 pounds, to be paid him, when he is of age, and more-  
 over two hundred pounds a year during his life, and  
 I Recommend him to all my friends protection, and  
 good services, also I Give to the Phacials for the time  
 being of the Amaine Society for the Use of the said So-  
 ciety one hundred pounds, also I Give to the poor of  
 Wilton two hundred pounds, also I Give to the poor of  
 Salisbury the sum of one hundred pounds, to be distri-

But amongst them as my Executors shall think fit,  
also I give to Mr. Angelo forty Pounds a year During  
his life, also to Mr. Angelo fifty Pounds. I desire all my  
Horses, Mares, Colts, Dogs and Creatures whatsoever,  
may be kept happy as long as they live, and I charge  
my Estate accordingly. I mean all whatsoever is any  
place or any Country whatsoever any ways belongs  
to me at the time of my Death at home, or abroad, and  
that if any are abroad any where, they should be sent for  
to England immediately, also I give to Mr. Charles  
Herbert, Son of my Deceased Uncle General William  
Herbert one hundred pounds per annum During  
his life, and to Mr. Robert Herbert another Son of  
my said Deceased Uncle General William Herbert  
two hundred pounds a year, During his life, and  
Miss Herbert Daughter of my said Uncle General  
William Herbert two thousand Pounds, I Give to  
Roger Staples one hundred pounds, I Give to James  
Harris Esq<sup>r</sup> of Salem one hundred pounds. I recom-  
mend the said Mr. Robert Herbert to one of the best li-  
ving of the ~~of the~~ Earl of Pembroke, and Mr. Heril  
my Cousin to another, to whom I Give one hundred  
Pounds (in case they should both or either of them go  
into orders) also I give to the Treasurers of Greenwich  
Hospital for the time being two hundred pounds, for  
the use of that Hospital, and to the Treasurers of  
Chelsea Hospital for the time being one hundred pounds  
for the use of that Hospital, to the Treasurers of St.  
Georges Hospital for the time being fifty pounds for  
the use of that Hospital. To the Treasurers of the  
Hospital commonly call'd the Foundling Hospital  
for the time being fifty pounds, for the use of that  
Hospital. To the Treasurers of the Small Pox, and In-  
cubation Hospital for the time being fifty Pounds for  
the use of that Hospital, And to the Treasurers of the  
Lock Hospital for the time being fifty pounds for the

out of that Hospital, and to the London Hospital at  
 the same, also I give to Mr. Anthony Sawyer two score 2,  
 said Pounds, To Mr. Des Clozeaux two hundred Pounds, as  
 To the Child of Antonio Picchi of Florence to whom I  
 stood Godfather, one annuity or yearly sum  
 of six pounds of Lawfull Money of Great Britain  
 for and During the Term of his Natural life  
 Clear of all Taxes and Deductions whatsoever.  
 To my Godson Henry De Messey, second son to Mr.  
 De Messey Consul of Lausanne in Switzerland, of  
 two hundred pounds, also I Give to the Child of  
 Mr. Angelo to whom I stood Godfather, one an-  
 nuity of twenty pounds of Lawfull Money of  
 Great Britain, for and During the Term of his  
 Natural life, clear of all Taxes and Deductions  
 whatsoever, To Mr. Bougelat Consul of Lyons two  
 hundred pounds. also I Give to Robert Harrison  
 three hundred pounds, To Mr. Burrell twenty Pounds  
 a year During his life. also I Give to Mr. Gore of  
 Salisbury one hundred pounds, and to Mr. Fawcett  
 of Wiltton two hundred Pounds. also I Give to  
 Mr. Maximilian Bengat the one at Wiltton, and  
 the Bowland arrows, and also the sum of two hun-  
 dred Pounds. also I Give to Mr. Edward Baker of  
 Pull bridge the sum of one hundred pounds, also  
 I Give to the Honourable James Stopford all my  
 Guns. I desire, that such of my Stone Horses, as  
 I leave may cover Grates for the Benefit of the  
 Country, and for rich Gentlemen, as may come  
 to sell or make to any of them, and this may be  
 conveniently advertised yearly as long, as the  
 Horses live. also I Give to Sir George Merriam one  
 hundred pounds, also I Give to Giuseppe Todderini  
 twenty pounds a year During his life. also I Give  
 to Daniel Mr. Adams one annuity of yearly sum  
 of forty Pounds of Lawfull Money of Great Britain,  
 for and During the Term of his Natural life clear

off all Taxes and Deductions whatsoever, payable  
Quarterly, the first Quarterly payment to be made  
at the End of three months next after my Death, —  
and I also give to Mr. John Little fifty Pounds, also  
I give to Lewis De Brett forty twenty Pounds, also  
I give to Mr. John Shelly one hundred Pounds, also  
I give to Captain Alex<sup>r</sup>. Mountgomery of Ireland  
one hundred pounds. also I give to William  
Wauthier Valet De Chambre two hundred pounds,  
and to James Keure by one annuity of twenty  
pounds a year During his life. also I give to  
Dalton twenty Pounds a year During his life. —  
also I give to William. Hoakes twenty Pounds a  
year During his life. also I give to Wyatt my  
Gardener twelve pounds a year During his life.  
I leave my manuscript Remarks and on  
Horsemanship &c<sup>o</sup> to Mr. James Stopford, and  
I direct that to whom any papers Bags or —  
parcels are directed, the same shall be delivered  
to such persons for their use unopened, and I de-  
sire that all my other papers, not on Business  
or consequence, may be immediately burnt. also  
I give to all my servants of whatsoever capacity,  
Sex, or Station soever, workman, Labourer &c<sup>o</sup> —  
both in Town and Country, and who shall be in  
service at the time of my Decease, and not dead  
before particularly named, the sum of three  
pounds a year each During their respective lives.  
also I give to my Grocers Ignace Joseph, and  
Hanny ten pounds a year to each of them During  
their respective lives. And also I give to the Reverend  
Mr. Thomas Hill now at present with Council  
Floyd two hundred pounds in Money, and moreover  
the sum of one hundred and fifty Pounds a  
year During his life, and recommend Mr. Floyd  
to his care and goodness. I likewise recommend  
the afore said Rev<sup>d</sup>. Mr. Hill to the first Vacant living

of the Earl of Pembroke. I gave the sum of one  
hundred Pounds to the following Gentlemen, - I,  
son of Huntingdon, Lord Bute, Captain Harbord,  
The Reverend Mr. Benjamin Woodroffe, the Hon<sup>ble</sup>  
noble Captain Augustus Heavey, Doctor Daines  
Barlow, Captain Lion, Captain Bayntun, Lieut<sup>ant</sup>  
nant Col. Erskine, S<sup>r</sup> Sydney Meadors, Mr. Thomas  
Bowlby, Mr. Berenger, S<sup>r</sup> Charles Bringham, Mr.  
William Hamilton, his Majesty's Equerry, Lord  
Charlemont, and Lord Newtown, and I desire  
that any Debts I may have made be discharged  
as soon as possible, after everything in this will  
is complied with.

I have given to Miss Catharina Elizabeth Hunter  
a Bond for twenty thousand Pounds, the Sum  
it was drawn up in makes me fear it will not  
stand good. If it should not, but not else,  
hereby bequeath to her the said Sum of twenty  
thousand Pounds, on condition that she imme-  
diately by will leaves it after her Death to any  
Child or Children equally divided amongst them,  
she may have from me, or be pregnant of from  
me at the time of my Death. If there should be  
no such Child or Children, or if there are such,  
and they should die, I leave the whole twenty  
thousand Pounds totally at her will, and plea-  
sure to possess and afterwards dispose of, as she may  
please. If there should be such a Child or Chil-  
dren, I recommend them and their Education to her  
in the same way, as I do in this will that of my  
lawfull Child to my wife, I leave her their Quan-  
tity, and beg in case of her Decease that the  
will immediately appoint others. also I give to  
Captain Robert Riddell to the Hunter Frigate  
two hundred Pounds. all the pecuniary Lega-  
cies about mentioned are to be Lawfull Money  
of great Britain, and to be paid within three.

Months after my Decease in case the same should  
be demanded. I Charge all my Estates both Real and  
personal, that I have power to Charge with the  
same, with the payment of all the before men-  
tioned Annuities and Legacies, and I desire my  
Executors herein after named may as soon as possi-  
bly may be after my Decease, give notice  
to all the Legacies herein named of so much of  
this my will, as relates to each Legatee. I make  
my wife sole Guardian of my son, and of every  
thing whatsoever belonging to him, as my Decease  
and recommend to her concerning him as follows  
That his Education may be first a French School  
next Etou, next abroad, and never at any En-  
glish University, that he may be taught, French  
Italian, and German, and follow the Exercises of  
Riding, Fencing and Dancing. That attention  
may be given to instruct him particularly in  
History and Mathematicks, and a little knowl-  
ge of the Law; that he may ~~be~~ not be an Idle  
Gentleman, but have some occupation, such  
as his Genius may prompt him to, he may  
Chuse. Whatever his vocation may be, let him  
begin early to engage in it, but not to be too soon  
abandoned, and left quite to himself nor too  
much contraind. I leave my House at White-  
Hall to my wife till my son is twenty five years  
of age, or is married, and for Life in case of my  
Decease and in case she has no other son by me.  
and I desire my said wife, in case of any unfor-  
seen accident to herself, immediately to name  
proper Guardians for my son as she shall  
think fit, in case of her Decease. and as to all the  
Rest, and residue of my Estate, not herein before  
disposed of, I give and bequeath the same to my  
son George Herbert, his Executors and Admin-  
istrators and I hereby nominate four to be

and appoint Mr. Henry Belton Legge, Mr. Robert Herbert, Mr. Antony Sawyer, Mr. Edward Le Grand, and the Honourable James Stappord, joint Executors of this my will, and I leave them five hundred pounds each, and hereby I do revoke, and make void all former and other wills by me at any time heretofore made, Declaring this only to be my last will and Testament, In Witness whereof I the said Henry Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery, the Testator have to this my last will and testament put and in this and the foregoing sheets of Paper set my Hand and seal to each Sheet the 11<sup>th</sup> Day of March one thousand seven hundred and sixty two, in the first Year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Third, by the Grace of God of Great Britain, France and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, and so forth at Utrecht. —
